- WHEREAS, the City of Seattle was built upon Duwamish lands and our city has greatly benefited since its founding in 1865 from Native American cultures, contributions, history, traditions and art; and
- WHEREAS, from generation to generation woodcarvers, singers, drummers, basket weavers, storytellers and many others have handed down invaluable cultural knowledge and rich traditions; and
- WHEREAS, John T. Williams was a member of the Ditidaht First Nation, a longtime Seattle resident and a master wood carver whose artistry was recognized locally and around the world; and
- WHEREAS, the loss of one person is the loss of many years of cultural knowledge and traditions; and
- WHEREAS, John T. Williams would have celebrated his 51st birthday on February 27, 2011; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Seattle acknowledges this loss and honors his memory; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Seattle supports the Williams family in the creation of a totem to honor John T. Williams and will provide space at the Seattle Center for the first phase of the carving from March 1 through April 30, 2011 and will provide space at Waterfront Park for the second phase of carving, starting May 1,
